The Judiciary and the Challenges of the Times

The Article focuses its discussion on the role of the Judiciary in the collective struggle of the society to revitalize and to give a new meaning to the Philippine democracy. It opens by giving a brief background on the challenges of times, particularly, the 1986 EDSA Revolution, which left a variety of societal problems, including but not limited to massive poverty, corruption, public distrust to the government, and a disjointed political system. It proceeds by looking into the role of the Judiciary in a democratic constitutional government, with emphasis placed on its being an *ultimate guardian* of order and rule of law. The Article also tackles the role of the Judiciary vis-à-vis the right of every citizen to justice, as embodied in the different constitutionally protected rights of the people.

It also examines the blueprint for judicial reform, as follows: (I) its objectives; (2) the judicial independence; (3) the steps taken toward a moral and competent judiciary; and (4) the goal of having an efficient court system. Lastly, the Article delves into matters beyond the court-bound reforms, particularly, people's right to access the courts, and how the Writ of Amparo becomes an instrument for the judicial system to serve as a refuge of the rights of Filipinos.
